October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month

Scammers use websites, emails, text messages and phone calls to obtain your personal information. These attempts to steal information are called phishing attacks. The individuals behind the attacks pose as a member of a trusted business or organization.

They regularly contact Cleco customers claiming to be representatives of the company and threaten service disconnection if customers don't make an immediate payment with a prepaid card. When customers don't answer the phone, they leave a call-back number.

Remember, Cleco will never initiate calls to demand immediate payment, and Cleco customer service representatives will never ask customers to pay with a prepaid card.

Common utility scams:

- Disconnection Deception: Scammers call threatening disconnection of service unless an immediate payment is made with a prepaid card or another form of payment.
- Overpayment Tactic: Scammers call claiming a bill overpayment, and request personal bank account information or a credit card number to facilitate a refund.
- Vacate Your Home: Scammers claim there is a need to replace a meter or other equipment, and the home must be vacated for 72 hours.
- Power Restoration Charge: Scammers call offering to restore your electricity more quickly for a fee after a severe storm.
- Identification Attack: Rather than directing victims to call a 1-800 number, the scammers direct callers to press 1 to collect data in an attempt to get additional personal information.

Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl, except for the nuts. After well mixed, add nuts and mix for a few more minutes. Pour into a greased 8 x 8 biscuit pan and bake at 400 degrees until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, 20 to 25 minutes.
