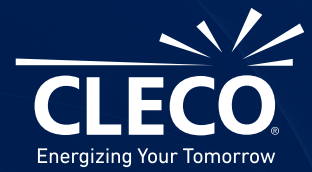

St. Mary's serves individuals with intellectual disabilities by providing personalized care and a community living environment.

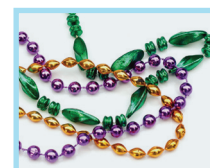


Groundbreaking marks construction start at Dolet Hills Solar Facility

Cleco Power and D.E. Shaw Renewable Investments (DESRI) have broken ground on the Dolet Hills Solar Facility, a 240-megawatt project in DeSoto Parish set to begin commercial operations in 2027.

The project marks an important step forward in Cleco Power's plan to offer customers renewable energy options.

The facility is expected to generate enough clean energy to power approximately 50,000 Louisiana homes and businesses each year.



> **Whether you're celebrating on a float or on the ground, avoid throwing beads on power lines.**

The Louisiana Legislature enacted the High Voltage Overhead Power Line Safety Act in 2001. Under this act, Louisiana law prohibits any unauthorized persons from working, including moving equipment, within 10 feet of any high voltage overhead line. If any unauthorized person intends to work within 10 feet of any high voltage overhead line, the person responsible for the work to be done must notify the owner or operator of the high voltage overhead line 48 hours prior to commencing work. Work shall be performed only after satisfactory mutual arrangements have been completed between the owner or operator of the high voltage overhead line and the person responsible for the work to be done.
